General School Updates

Winter Arrangements

When we have cold winter weather, please ensure all children come to school in a warm coat, hat and gloves to ensure they are suitably dressed for playing outside. If children come to school in wellies/snow boots, please ensure they have their school shoes with them to change into upon arrival.

Delayed registration due to snow/ice: if the weather conditions are preventing staff getting into school in the morning, the Headteacher (in conjunction with the Chair of Governors) may delay registration. This decision takes into account the road and weather conditions at the time (usually 7.00am) and the predicted forecast around 8.30am when most children are en-route to school.

Delayed registration enables families to travel safely to school when the road may be clearer but means that school is open as usual and children can still be brought to school from 8.45am.

However please note in this situation there will not be any before school activities for Class 4 eg. Reading Plus. All children should aim to be in school by 9.00am but, if this is not possible, they should ensure they are in school at the time of the delayed registration (e.g. 9.30am). Please note that if school is open and your child is not in school for registration and a valid reason has not been provided, then an unauthorised absence will be marked in the register for that session.

School procedures

As we are starting a new term, we take this opportunity to remind parents/carers about our school procedures:

Before school

Please note that school starts at 9.00am and children line up in the playground when the bell rings at 8.55am. Children should therefore **not** be in the school building prior to 8.55am unless they are taking part in a before school club/activity eg. Reading Plus or by prior arrangement. The period between 8.30am and 8.55am is an extremely busy time in school and staff are not available to supervise children. To help us keep your children safe, particularly in the event of a fire, please ensure they remain in the main playground (not the main school entrance area) until the bell rings.

Children with pack ups can place their lunch bags on the trolley when entering school with the class teacher. We will endeavour to ensure that a member of staff is always on the playground from 8.45am. Many thanks for your support.

Communication/Queries

Our weekly newsletter can be found on the school website along with this half-term's extended schools' activity form and notes to parents/carers. If you have any queries regarding clubs, please use the school website as your first port of call instead of telephoning school. Due to the busy school office environment, it is not always possible for Mrs Ellison to get back to you in the time frame required.

Illness/Absence/Medical Appointments

If your child will not be in school for registration due to illness, other absence or medical appointments, please ensure you contact the school office by 8.45am at the latest on the day to enable the register to be noted accordingly.

If you leave a message on the school answer machine, please ensure you provide a reason for your child's absence.

We would be grateful if you could inform the school office if your child has a medical appointment ~ this also applies if you are collecting your child during the school day so that Mrs Ellison is aware of the time you will be coming into school to collect your child.

Please note that, in order to prevent the spread of the sickness virus around school, please do not send your child into school if they have been sick at home the night before or on the morning of school ~ please note that children always tell us when they've been sick and we will then have to call you to pick them up!

Making contact with class teachers before school

Lothersdale Primary School is very proud of its 'open door policy' and its strong relationship with parents/carers and families. Throughout the year there will be times when parents/carers need to talk to teachers before school when something has 'cropped up' e.g. their child is upset about something. It is very important to us that these matters are followed up quickly and we would request that parents/carers follow the procedures below. These are in preference to waiting until the class teacher collects his/her class from the playground at 8.55am, as this can result in the teachers being late for registration and delay the start of lessons. Also, between 8.45 and 8.55am, class teachers are talking to their teaching assistants about the morning lessons and we would ask parents/carers to avoid calling into the school office and requesting to speak to teachers, or Mrs Robinson, during this time to avoid any disruption to this key part of the school day unless it is urgent.

If you wish to speak to a class teacher, or Mrs Robinson, before school starts please either:

- Telephone school between 8.00 and 8.15am to arrange a short face to face meeting or telephone call with a class teacher or Mrs Robinson on the same morning before school between 8.30 and 8.45am.
- If the query is less important, please telephone school between 8.00am and 12.00pm and leave a message for a teacher to telephone you back on the same day and answer your questions or to make an appointment to meet in school.

Please also note that class teachers will normally be on the playground at the end of the school day and are available to talk to at this time as well.

School Uniform

May we remind parents/carers that traditional black school shoes should be worn by children in school as part of our School Uniform Policy. Please do not send children in black boots (this includes Doc Martins), trainers, fashion shoes or ballet style shoes as these are not regulated footwear suitable for everyday school life. A copy of our school uniform list is available to view on the school website.

Long Hair

May we remind parents/carers that children with long hair must have hair tied back in a ponytail/plait. Hair clips and bobbles (in the Lothersdale School colours - royal blue, black or grey) should be small and unobtrusive.

Primary School Admissions ~ September 2020

Online applications are currently being made via the Local Authority for reception places at Lothersdale Primary School for September 2020. The online common application form must be submitted by no later than 15 January 2020. If you are the parent/carer of a child, or know of a child, who is eligible to start primary school next September and whose name is not on the school's register of interest, please contact the school as soon as possible.

School Meal Menu ~ Spring Term First Half

The school meal menu continues as per last term and the menu has been updated with the spring term dates for your information and is attached herewith. A copy can also be found on the school website.

Pupils on Packed Lunches

May we remind parents to ensure their child's pack up is clearly named to help us distribute at lunchtime. If your child is on Friday lunches, the cost for the spring term will be £29.28 or £2.44 per week payable in advance.

School Meals ~ Class 3 and Class 4

The cost of school meals for children in Class 3 and Class 4 from 6 January 2020 will continue to be £2.44 per meal (£12.20 per week) for all children.

For parents/carers who wish to pay up to the end of term (Friday 3 April 2020), the cost will be £143.96 per child payable via ParentPay.

For parents/carers who wish to pay up to the end of half-term (Friday 14 February 2020), the cost will be £70.76 per child payable via ParentPay.

Alternatively, parents/carers can pay weekly (£12.20) via ParentPay.

Please note that school meals must be paid for in advance and we would also ask parents/carers to refer to the school's School Meals' Arrears Procedure (available to view on the school website) to ensure that you are familiar with the school's course of action should you find yourselves falling behind with payments.

Please check your ParentPay accounts for credits/outstanding payments (eg illness, educational visits etc) and adjust your child's account accordingly when paying the above.

Eligibility for Free School Meals

May we remind parents that free school meals are available for children whose parents/carers meet the relevant criteria. If you are in receipt of one or more of the following benefits and think you may qualify, please either ask Mrs Ellison for an application form or use the application form available via www.northyorks.gov.uk/freeschoolmeals.

The relevant criteria is based on receipt of:

- income support
- income-based job seeker's allowance
- income-related employment and support allowance
- child tax credit with an income of less than £16,190 and not in receipt of working tax credit
- support under part VI of the immigration and asylum act 1999
- guarantee element of state pension credit.

Where parents are entitled to working tax credit during a four week "run on" period immediately after their employment has ceased, or after they have started to work less than 16 hours per week, their children are entitled to free school meals.

Children who receive income support or income based jobseeker's allowance in their own right are also entitled to free school meals.

Applications are usually processed the same day. If your child is entitled to free school meals you will receive a letter confirming the date when the meals will start. The school is also notified that your child is entitled to free school meals.

In the meantime, you should continue to pay for school meals until confirmation comes through. Schools may be able to arrange a reimbursement of any monies paid whilst your entitlement is being confirmed. If you are not entitled to free school meals you will be notified in writing.

WILD *about* Lothersdale!

Why Trees Matter

Did you know that the UK has only 13% woodland cover compared to the EU average of 37%? On our doorstep in the Dales, this falls to 5%! Planting trees is one of the most important yet simple things you can do for the environment. From planting a single tree in your garden or a boundary hedge, to creating whole woods, restoring the area covered by trees will help to:

- Absorb carbon, provide shade, improve air quality and combat climate change.

- Create habitat for wildlife and support biodiversity.
- Create natural spaces where people can relax and enjoy themselves.
- Protect the landscape against flooding and erosion and improve water quality.
- Restore part of our natural landscape that's been lost due to deforestation.

There are currently national, regional and local schemes to reverse the decline. **The Northern Forest** aims to plant 50 million trees via community forests in and around Liverpool, Chester, Manchester, Leeds, Sheffield and Hull by 2032. **Yorkshire Water** has pledged to plant 1 million trees on its assets over the next 10 years, and the **Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust** has already planted 1.5million broadleaf/native trees throughout Yorkshire Dales and Nidderdale with the ambition to double woodland cover by 2020.

The Lothersdale Woodland Group was set up in 2015 as a volunteer community group working with the Parish Council and effecting change with the help of village residents. I spoke to coordinator Jon Grey, about the work done so far and plans for the future.

Q - How did this come about in Lothersdale?

Originally, the group formed to rehabilitate the woodland around the park, successfully applying for a community grant from the Woodland Trust to improve access, manage the site and introduce amenities like the bird hide. The community and school were consulted. Since then, we have 'branched out', trying to link patches of woodland or create steppingstones of wooded habitat.

All of the valley would have been wooded at some point. Place names like Oakcliffe and Woodhead hint at what was. Clearance for agriculture and fuel for historical industries have changed the landscape dramatically.

Q - Don't we already have lots of trees in Lothersdale?

Compared to some nearby villages, we are quite well off but there are some very barren areas. One worry is that many of the existing copses are dominated by mature trees and there is no natural regeneration, in most cases because of livestock browsing the saplings. Once we start to lose those mature trees, there is nothing in the pipeline to replace them. And judging by the uptake around the village, clearly many people would like to see more.



Q-Which tree and hedge species have you planted?

Different trees have different needs and we have been careful to select native species to match conditions found around the village. They must be hardy up here! It also depends upon function as well, so dense, scrubby species for hedges or shelter-belts, or willows to suck up excess water.

Q - Where do the trees come from?

We continue to apply successfully to the Woodland Trust and Trust for Conservation Volunteers for 'packages of tree whips' for specific projects. We have also linked various landowners to stewardship schemes for planting up larger areas of land. And some have been grown on by green fingered folk around the village.

Q - Where have you planted already?

I think we should back-track slightly and acknowledge the amazing efforts of folk like Berb Clement and Michael Binns who have planted something like 36000 and 15000, respectively, and I am sure there are others. As a volunteer group, in the last three winters we have directly planted close to 4000 but facilitated planting of another 20000. The schoolkids are tending to the hedgerows in the park, and we've done lots of work at Woodhead, the sewage works and above White Hill Lane along the Pennine Way.

Q - Where do you plan to plant in 2020?

This winter, we aim to bolster numbers along the Pennine Way but we need to focus on a bit of maintenance too, and so will revisit some sites.

Q - How do you plant trees successfully?

Good planning and preparation. The whips have to be looked after between delivery and planting, generally by 'healing' the roots into some leaf mulch and keeping them wet. Site species appropriately for the ground conditions, knock back or screef the turf, and try to create some more natural spacing rather than a regimented plot. It needs to be done while the trees are dormant so November to March is generally good, avoiding hard frosts.

Q - Care and maintenance of trees we plant?

It's important to try and keep the tubes free from competing grasses. During the Great British Spring Clean 2019, I supervised two classes from the school to lift the tubes, pull out the grass, replace any missing tubes or canes, and recycle those not required. One job for this winter will be recycling of tubes!

Q - How long will they take to reach maturity?

A frequent comment I get is that 'I'll never see the benefit'. It is true none of us will see any of the oaks maturing, but smaller species like hawthorn, hazel, sloes, rowan, crab apple etc will be sufficiently mature to start fruiting in 5-10 years. While a mature 'woodland' is definitely a legacy, the benefits listed at the beginning of your article start accruing from the day of planting.

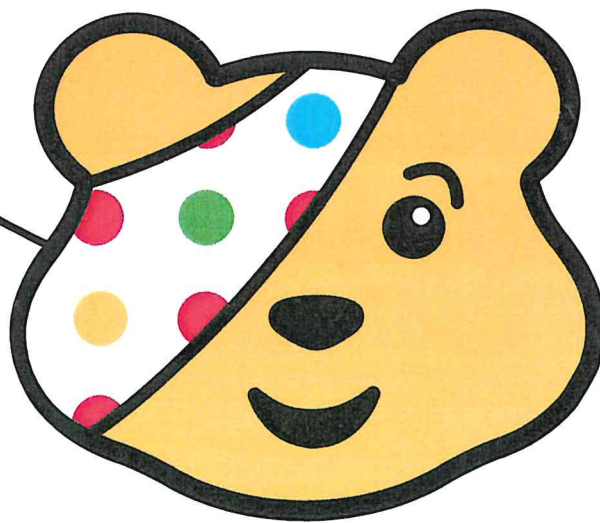
