Safer Internet Day

This year's key message is 'Together for a better internet' and Safer Internet Day is celebrated globally in February each year to promote the safe and positive use of digital technology for children and young people and inspire a national conversation.

Tina and Melissa, the PCSOs, came into school on Monday to deliver Key Stage assemblies about staying safe when using the internet.

They spoke to children in Class 3 and Class 4 about what sort of information they could, and should not, share online. The children were advised about who to accept as friends online and to ask themselves 'is this someone you really know?' The children carried on with these discussions in class. They shared the story '#goldilocks a cautionary tale', which Miss Gallagher has added to the school website under Class 3 and Class 4 pages and handouts were given to the children to take home.



Children in Class 1 and Class 2 watched a CEOP (Child Exploitation and Online Protection) video about two children called Lee and Kim, and learnt how to stay safe while online gaming. Two puppets, 'Cool Cat' and 'Dirty Dog', were used to show the children that people may not always be who they say they are when online. Cool Cat was honest, Dirty Dog tried to trick them! Mrs Bateman continued the theme with a follow up story and gave all the children stickers with top tips for staying safe online.

There are also lots of resources available on the website for parents and carers to use at home, which include suggestions for using technology responsibly, respectfully, critically and creatively.

Class 1 ~ Visit from Paramedics









KS2 ART CLUB SPRING TERM 2020 ~ FIRST HALF

We started the New Year 2020 with a project that welcomed and celebrated the new decade.

We designed fantastic posters with the numbers 2020 in the centre of them using repeated abstract black and white patterns balanced with the colourful background.





We looked at different ideas using the Zentangle method and created our own little zentangle design cards testing out various abstract patterns and effects.


The next project was more focused on the natural world and the first signs of Spring around us. We looked at different

mixed media paintings of snowdrops using a resistance technique in which we combined wax and watercolours.



The Call of the Curlew

One of the pleasures of living in Lothersdale, is the arrival each February of Europe's largest wading bird, the curlew. Seeing its distinctive features and hearing its evocative calls is a signal for me that marks the beginning of Spring and (hopefully) the end of the dog walks up on Tow Top in gales, rain, snow and the dark!

Curlew are about the size of a female pheasant, sporting blueish long legs and a mottled brown and grey plumage. In flight, the curlew exhibit a striking white 'V' shape on their lower back and rump. Its most distinctive feature is the long down-curving bill tarily hovering and bubbling loudly, the male then (The first part of its Latin name 'Numenius arguata' translates as crescent moon), that they use to probe the ground for worms and insects. If you see a pair together, the female will have the slightly longer bill of the two

Before you see the first curlew of the season, you will probably hear their distinctive bleating 'COURIi' call that gives the bird its common name. Later, you will also hear a 'bubbling' call as they perform their

territorial displays. This behaviour is the primary reason for their presence above Lothersdale from February to July - to breed on wet grasslands, managed hayfields, heath and moorlands.

The males normally arrive a few days before the females and begin to establish their territories. There is evidence that curlew return to the same territory each year and when they are ready to breed, the male curlew will mark out his territory with an undulating display flight. You will recognize this pattern of behaviour, as the male flies low over his territory and then suddenly rises steeply, rapidly beating his wings. After momenplanes downwards, his wings forming a shallow V. This is repeated a number of times.

Out of sight, more displays on the ground will follow and once a pair-bond has been established, you will see both birds in the air together, gliding side by side. For me, the sight of a pair of curlew in flight is one of the delights of spring-time walks up to Pinhaw Beacon.

The curlew's nest is little more than a simple scrape in the ground (created by the male as part of the display) and has been chosen from a number of scrapes on offer, by the female. A typical clutch of four eggs are laid in April/May and both parents share incubation duties until hatching in June.

As with other ground-nesting birds, curlew chicks are encouraged to start foraging for food as soon as possible. A chick's down is normally pinky/cream, mottled with black and brown, providing good camouflage. They need all the help they can get to survive to fledging, some five weeks later. Whenever danger threatens, the adults will emit a 'danger call' and the chicks will go into cover. The adults will then attack the intruder or attempt to distract them from locating the chicks.



Predators are numerous and range from foxes and domestic cats on the ground, to crows and gulls from the air. They also have to contend with man-made hazards from harvesting machinery, to disturbance from wandering farm animals and humans.

Also factor in the increasingly adverse weather conditions caused by climate change, which can affect their food availability and it's not surprising to read that approximately 25% of curlew survive from egg to fledging, about 1 per breeding pair per season.

Towards the end of June, the adult females will depart first, leaving the young with the males. As the young curlew fledge, they join the adult males and move off to join the females. You will see flocks of curlew towards the end of the breeding season. These are groups of failed breeders, who display and call, before heading to their over-wintering sites.

From Lothersdale and surrounding area, it is believed curlew migrate to the estuaries on the North West coast of England (principally Morecambe Bay) and possibly further onto Ireland. They then winter in flocks, until their return, the following Spring.



The curlew's UK breeding population is declining, losing half of the breeding population since 1995. So, what can we do to help maintain the curlew population, here in Lothersdale?

Be aware that curlew (and other ground nesting birds) nest from April to July. As with lambing during the same period, please keep all dogs under control. The distracting flight and distress calls of adults flying overhead will let you know a nest or chicks are in the vicinity. The RSPB has also issued guidance for land owners. Key points as follows:

- Retain and restore rough, damp pasture and traditional hay meadows.
- Provide mixed vegetation through the breeding season short grass along with taller reeds/ undergrowth
- Timing of cutting grass is critical in meadows. If you do cut between April and July, leaving an uncut margin at the field edge will help maintain some cover for the birds. Also mowing from the centre outwards may help move chicks to field margins.
- Provide damp areas, wet flushes or small shallow pools as feeding areas for chicks.
- Studies have shown curlew breeding is improved in areas where game management is practiced, due to control of main predators like foxes.
